

## Professor Graham Ayliffe

It is with great sadness that the International Federation of Infection Control community received the news of the death of Professor Graham Ayliffe, who passed away in hospital on Monday 22nd May 2017 at the age of 91 years.

Professor Ayliffe, one of the Founding Fathers of IFIC, studied medicine at Bristol University, joining the Department of Pathology at Bristol Royal Infirmary in 1955 where he worked under Professor William Gillespie, before moving to the Hammersmith Hospital in 1963. He was awarded an MD from the University of Bristol.

Professor Ayliffe had a distinguished trajectory, as he is internationally recognised for his work at the Hospital Infection Research laboratory (HIRL) (currently City Hospital in Birmingham), where he was a core contributor to Professor Edward Lowbury's team, and responsible for the day-to-day running of the Laboratory. In 1980 he was appointed as Director of the same, until his retirement in 1994.

His well known book Control of Hospital Infection was first published in 1975, and is now in its Fifth Edition, an invaluable companion to those working in the field of Infection Prevention and Control. He was one of the founders of the Healthcare Infection Society, and served as its first Chair (1980 – 1984), as President (1988 - 1994), and also as the first Editor of the Journal of Hospital Infection (JHI). During his exceptional career, he was also Chair/President of the Infection Control Nurses Association (now the Infection Prevention Society, IPS)-UK, and Chair of Central Sterilising Club (CSC)-UK.

Graham Ayliffe was passionate about training and education, and a great believer in offering nurses the best training possible. He developed one of the first training programmes for infection control nurses, setting up EN 329 course in Birmingham, UK.

Recognizing the need for international collaboration, and together with colleagues from the USA, South Africa and Sweden, he helped establish the International Federation of Infection Control (IFIC). His leadership was crucial to the development of a platform for international collaboration and networking amongst Infection Prevention and Control professionals across the globe. He became IFIC's Chair from 1993 to 1996, developed its Newsletter (now grown into the Society's Journal, the International Journal of Infection Control, IJIC), and contributed extensively to the Basic Concepts in Infection Control book.

His lifetime work in research, education and support are recognized by IFIC in the Graham Ayliffe Certificate of Lifetime Achievement, which was set up in his name, and is awarded to those who made important contributions to Infection Prevention and Control across the globe. It was a great pleasure to his many friends that he was able to attend the IFIC Conference in Malta as recently as 2014, where the Certificate was given to one of his successors at the HIRL and the CSC.

His wife Janet, who accompanied him on so many visits to IFIC conferences, survives him. On behalf of IFIC, we would like to express our sincere condolences to Janet and their family at this time.
